



The following are a few items to please keep in mind to ensure that we have a successful snow season moving into the 2025-2026 snow season.

- We ask parents to remind their children to be aware of snow plowing operations and the hazards posed by extreme winter driving conditions, such as reduced visibility and increased vehicle stopping distances. Children may be attracted to heavy equipment like snowplow trucks and loaders. Keep children away from the roadway when crews are performing snow and ice control operations. Do not let children sled or play in the street during winter weather events.

-Please do not leave vehicles parked or standing in neighborhood roadway. By doing so, you create an unsafe situation for drivers and interfere with traffic movement and snow removal efforts. Avoid parking vehicles on the street if winter weather is in the forecast. Park cars in a driveway or off-street parking so Wallace Teams can work safely, efficiently, and quickly. To avoid damage, do not allow your vehicle to extend into the roadway. When vehicles are parked on narrow roadways, on hills, or both sides of the street, Wallace may not be able to clear snow from the street efficiently. Please remove all cords and or items that may be run from your units to parked vehicles. As a reminder Wallace Commercial Landscape will not be liable if cords or other items are left out and damaged by the plows and ground crews

Other Items to be aware of:

- **Trash Receptacles-** To reduce the likelihood of damage, place trash receptacles on driveways or at the front of unit. Trash receptacles placed close to the street edge may be tipped over or damaged during snow plowing operations.
- **- DO NOT CROWD THE PLOW: MAINTAIN SAFE DISTANCE.** Snowplows are large and operators cannot see directly behind the truck.
- **SLOW DOWN WHEN YOU SEE A SNOWPLOW.** Snowplows travel at a slower speed; the most common crashes are motorists hitting the rear end of the plow. Stay alert and watch for a plow's amber lights.
- **DO NOT PASS PLOW ON RIGHT.** Plows push snow to the right shoulder.

- **DO NOT PASS IN A SNOW CLOUD.** Be sure the road ahead is clear of vehicles or snowdrifts before attempting to pass on the left. A snow cloud could be caused by crosswinds or by a snowplow, so be patient.
- **REMEMBER: PLOWS DO MORE THAN PLOW.** Plow trucks also spread salt and sand; deicing agents may spray your car. Maintain a safe distance between your car and the snowplow and be extremely cautious when passing on the left. Remember - do NOT pass a snowplow on the right.
- A snowplow driver often has low visibility during storms or when plowing because snow is constantly flying onto the windshield. This makes it hard for the driver to see anyone along the road.
- While the plow truck is backing up, be aware. The driver may not be able to see you in his/her mirrors. Move far away off the road, away from the truck.

-Please be advised that Wallace Commercial Landscape does not start plowing/pushing snow until such snow fall reaches an accumulation of 2". All housing streets are plowed during heavy snowfall, and all will be plowed. We ask that you please be patient during snow removal operations. Our crews work as quickly as they can during inclement weather, typically overnight and in the early morning hours.

Plowing creates a snow berm at the street edge and across driveways each time a street is plowed. We recommend delaying driveway shoveling until snowplows have completed and significant snowfall is not anticipated. Please deposit snow shoveled off driveways to the turf park way to the right and left of drives, and not back into the street area. If snow continues to fall, plows will continue to plow, to ensure that the road is passable for all vehicles. Salt and sand are applied at the end of the snow fall as the snow slows down. Please also be aware that the ground crew will start to clear the sidewalks within the footprint once the snow is slowing and subsiding.
